Second Coming

What does the Second Coming mean for the Christian?

Since the promise in the Garden of Eden given to Adam and Eve (Gen. 3:15) of a Redeemer, God's people have had a longing in their hearts for His coming. As early as seven generations from Adam, God gave to Enoch revelations of His second coming. Enoch prophesied, "Behold, the Lord comes with ten thousands of His saints, to execute judgment on all, to convict all who are ungodly among them of all their ungodly deeds which they have committed in an ungodly way, and of all the harsh things which ungodly sinners have spoken against Him." (Jude 15)

The Bible tells of individuals who longed for the time that they could personally be with their Redeemer. Biblical characters like Abraham, Moses, King David, Daniel, John the Revelator, and Lazarus' sister Mary were among those who had a closeness to God and a longing to be with Him.

Down through the ages from Bible times to our day, God has had individuals who had a deep longing to be close to Him and be where He is. It is for people who have this longing that the Second Coming is going to take place. God has had a similar desire to be with His people.

God doesn't want His people to be troubled by the events in the world leading up to His return. He doesn't want our hearts to be troubled, but to be filled with hope:

Let not your heart be _____; you believe in God, believe also in Me. In My Father's house are _____ mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to _____ a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I _____ come again and receive you to Myself; that where I am, _____ also. (John 14:1-3 NKJV)

The Second Coming is the one theme that runs through the whole Bible, giving hope to God's people and is the culmination of this world's history. The Bible gives the believer much to anticipate in regards to the Second Coming.

A Cleansing & Consuming Fire

Fire is often mentioned throughout the Bible in many contexts. Not the least of which is in relation to God, heaven, and judgement. Throughout this section of the video various passages describing the role that fire plays in relation to God.

In Heaven

- Lucifer walked among fiery stones. (Ezekiel 28:14)
- God's throne is a fiery flame. (Daniel 7:9)
- Angels are a flame of fire. (Hebrews 1:7)
- Sea of glass is mingled with fire. (Revelation 15:2)
- God has the appearance of fire. (Ezekiel 1:27)

God's Word & Law

- God's Word is a burning fire. (Jeremiah 20:9)
- God's law is referred to as "fiery". (Deuteronomy 33:2)

Presence of God & Judgment

- A fiery stream issues from before God. (Daniel 7:10)
- God will reveal Himself in flaming fire. (2 Thessalonians 1:7, 8)
- God is a consuming fire. (Hebrews 12:29)
- The wicked perish as wax before a fire. (Psalm 68:2)
- Who can swell with the devouring fire? (Isaiah 33:14)

God's Love as Fire

- Song of Solomon celebrates the love between husband and wife that God gives as a gift. In Solomon 8:6 this love is compared to “coals of fire.” The word in the Hebrew for this love is the same word used to describe the love God has for His people (Hosea 11:4, Jeremiah 31:3, Isaiah 63:9)

Throughout the Scriptures there are many instances in which fire plays a leading role. Often times, the fire has a spiritual significance that parallels the above passages. The following Biblical stories contain references to fire that correspond to the above categories. As you read these passages, identify what role fire plays.

Faith via the Sanctuary

The Bible reminds us that our sin has separated us from God (Isaiah 59:2). The only way to be able to dwell in God's presence is for sin to be removed. There are two ways this can happen: we can follow God's plan for the removal of sin from us, or we can bear the sin ourselves and be destroyed with the sin.


God provided the earthly sanctuary as a visible, living demonstration of this process and how God works to remove sin. Although we no longer have this earthly representation, by faith we
